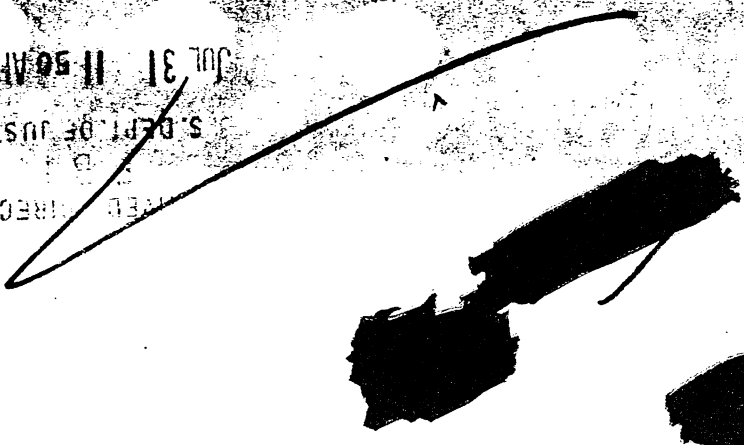

My dear Mr. Lay:

In a communication dated January 23, 1951, the Department of the Army furnished this Bureau the following information which was received from the Military Attache at Heidelberg, Germany, and is captioned:

"HICOG FRANKFURT GERMANY PASS TO USARMA PRAGUE  
CZECHOSLOVAKIA

EX-23 86 - **RECORDED** MAR 10 1951  
Subject is possible violation paragraph 12B  
(2) AR 880-5, Truck and trailer containing consignment  
of goods shipped by [redacted]

[redacted] and going to Metrans and Eurotrans of Prague, CSR was checked by 7751st Military Police Customs Unit at legal crosspoint Waidhaus (N 50/P 42) at approximately 1400 hours 15 Jan. Part of the consignment consists of 8 wooden boxes weighing approximately 466 pounds which were listed as 'books.' Two of boxes listed as coming from Smithsonian Institute, 3rd from Yale University. The boxes were shipped by the US lines from pier 8, Port Covington, Maryland. Examination of contents of boxes revealed estimated 2500 publications including current Army Regulations, Special Regulations, Air Force Regulations, National Guard Regulations, Field Manuals, official publications of the Patent Office, and proceedings of Congress. None of the above documents bore classification. American Consulate Rotterdam **RE** advised boxes are government shipments from [redacted] US Dispatch Agent, New York. Rotterdam Consulate responsible for shipping via Dutch trucking company. knew nothing of contents or reason for shipment. Boxes impounded pending completion investigation. Request investigation XI to determine legality of shipment, use of Yale and Smithsonian Institute labels and ulterior motive for shipment."

Investigation by this Bureau has disclosed that according to [redacted] Chief, International Exchange Service, Smithsonian Institute, 9 boxes of books and documents which were seized in Germany were part of a 17 box shipment weighing 2,939 pounds from the International Exchange Service which were shipped on December 14, 1950 under Government Bill of Lading, No. SI-5130. The shipment was picked up by the Davidson Transfer and Storage Company in Washington, D. C. for delivery to Pier 8 at Port Covington, Maryland. Four boxes were going to the International Exchange Service, Royal Library, The Hague, Holland; 2 boxes to the Hungarian Libraries Branch, Budapest, Hungary; 3 boxes to Service Belge Des Echanges Internationaux Bibliothique Royal De Belgique, Brussels, Belgium; 5 boxes to Bibliothique Centrale Federale, Service Suisse Des Echanges Internationaux Palais Federal, Berns, Switzerland, and 3 boxes to the National and University Library in care of Rijnac and Sula Eurotrans, Prague 2, Czechoslovakia. Netrans and Eurotrans of Prague mentioned in the enclosure to your letter was determined to be a brokerage firm who would have handled the shipment in Czechoslovakia and delivered 3 boxes to the National and University Library. Section 139A, title 44, U. S. Code provides for this interchange of books and publications, according to [redacted]

Investigation further discloses that by letter dated January 21, 1950, the State Department advised the National and University Library at Prague, Czechoslovakia, that [redacted] was the official depository for Czechoslovakia. The monthly catalogue of U. S. Government publications sets forth a list of documents published by the Government Printing Office and this list is marked with black circles in each instance where publications are automatically furnished to depository libraries. [redacted] advises that publications of private institutions, such as Harvard and Yale Universities and other schools and associations, are forwarded by such institutions to the Smithsonian Institute to be sent to depository libraries. He advises that 2 of the boxes involved, No. 996 and 997, contained Government and private institutions' books and publications; that box No. 704 consists of official documents of the United States Government. [redacted] advised that the Smithsonian Institute does not decide which publications should be sent and stated the program is handled by the Library of Congress and the Department of State. [redacted]

stated that government agencies having documents printed by the Government Printing Office could, if they desired, take necessary steps to protect the security of such documents. He stated that while all books and documents sent have wide distribution in the United States and are not classified, there is some question as to whether some books and documents should be sent to Russia and her satellite countries; but such security steps are not in the hands of the Smithsonian Institute or the agencies having the publications printed. [REDACTED] stated that no censorship of the documents is made by the Smithsonian Institute. He stated that G-2 in Washington, D. C., the Library of Congress, and the State Department are aware of the true status of the documents seized. It was his opinion that paragraph 12B (2) AR 380-5 pertains only to members of the Department of the Army in furnishing information of either a classified or nonclassified nature to foreign nationals and does not pertain to instant shipment.

No further investigation is being conducted by this Bureau unless a request to the contrary is received from the Department of the Army.
