

for the employee to be employed in the capacity of a consultant by the Radiation Laboratory. He stated that the employee impressed him considerably concerning his loyalty to the United States. He said that to the best of his knowledge, the employee and his wife are of good character, associates and loyal citizens.

DR. EDWARD TELLER, Consultant, Radiation Laboratory, advised that he has known JOHN VON NEWMANN since 1925. He said that VON NEWMANN was born in Budapest, Hungary, and that he knew him in Germany, England and the United States, and that he worked with him at Los Alamos, New Mexico in 1943. DR. TELLER related that VON NEWMANN is a genius of a scientist and that he has made some great contributions to science. He said that VON NEWMANN is acutely aware of the great danger of the Russian plans for world domination, and DR. TELLER proclaimed that VON NEWMANN is definitely "Anti-Russian."

DR. TELLER went on to relate that he considered VON NEWMANN to be a person of good character, and that his associates were of good choice. He added that in lieu of the fact that VON NEWMANN is such a brilliant person and scientist that his work brings him in contact with a wide variety of individuals and that undoubtedly he has had contact with some individuals who are sympathetic to Communist causes, but he felt that he was not closely associated with any such individuals. He reiterated that he believed that VON NEWMANN was positively loyal to the United States in all respects and that he is a person who can keep a secret and be discreet in his conversations relative to security matters.

DR. TELLER continued that he has been acquainted with VON NEWMANN's wife, KLARA, since approximately 1945, and although he is not well acquainted with her, she has never given him any reason to cause doubt concerning her character, loyalty, and associates.

CREDIT AND CRIMINAL

The files of the Livermore Police Department and the Credit Bureau of Livermore Valley did not contain any record or unfavorable information concerning the employee.

The files of the Berkeley Police Department and Credit Bureau of the Greater East Bay, as checked by SE [REDACTED] did not contain any record or unfavorable information concerning the employee. b7c

Mrs. ROSANNA JAFFIN, Secretary to the Director, advised that Dr. VON NEUMANN joined the faculty of the Institute for Advanced Study in 1933 and that he now enjoys permanent tenure at this institution. She said he is Director of their Electronic Computer Project and as such handles much confidential data. Mrs. JAFFIN added that VON NEUMANN presently resides at 26 Westcott Road, Princeton, N.J.

Dr. HERMAN H. GOLDSTINE, Assistant Director, Electronic Computer Project, Institute for Advanced Study, advised he has known VON NEUMANN for the past thirteen years and has been intimately associated with him since 1942. Dr. GOLDSTINE characterized VON NEUMANN as being one of the most brilliant mathematicians in the world today. He said VON NEUMANN has done considerable research in mathematics and physics at the Institute and that he has made many vital contributions toward the defense efforts of this country. GOLDSTINE said VON NEUMANN's interests are those primarily of a scientist and that he had never evidenced in his presence any great interest in political matters.

Dr. GOLDSTINE described VON NEUMANN as conscientious, trustworthy, above reproach morally and professionally, and of unquestionable loyalty to this country. GOLDSTINE said he knew of no one he could recommend more highly for a position involving the security of this country.

Dr. ATLE SELBERG, Mathematics Department, Institute for Advanced Study, advised he has been acquainted with Dr. VON NEUMANN for the past six years and that his opinions of him are very favorable. SELBERG said VON NEUMANN impressed him as being extremely capable, conscientious, of good moral habits and associations, and undoubtedly a loyal American citizen. SELBERG said on the basis of his association with VON NEUMANN he would not hesitate to recommend him for a position of trust and confidence.

Dr. DEANE MONTGOMERY, Mathematics Department, Institute for Advanced Study, furnished substantially the same information regarding VON NEUMANN as did Dr. SELBERG.

Mrs. BETTY GORMAN, Secretary to Dr. VON NEUMANN, advised she has worked closely with him for the past three years and that all her contacts and dealings with him have been most satisfactory. She said Dr. VON NEUMANN has conducted himself in a manner above reproach and that she had absolutely no reason to question his character, loyalty, or associations.

Mrs. GEORGE S. HENDRY, 47 Westcott Road, advised that the VON NEUMANNs resided at the above listed address at the time she moved into this neighborhood approximately four years ago. She said she is not closely associated with them, explaining that nearly everyone residing on Westcott Road is connected with Princeton University and that most of the social contacts made by them are with their professional associates within the University.

Mrs. HENDRY said that insofar as she knows the VON NEUMANNs enjoy a fine reputation in the Princeton, N.J., area. Mrs. HENDRY said she felt she did not know them well enough to be in a position to recommend VON NEUMANN for a position of trust, however, she said that she has never heard anything that would make her question his loyalty to this country; she further stated that she did not believe the VON NEUMANNs were closely associated with anyone in the immediate neighborhood as most of their social contacts were with people connected with the Institute for Advanced Study, Princeton, New Jersey.

HENSON, contracts coordinator, Carbide and Carbon Chemicals Company, advised that JOHN VON NEUMANN has Consultant Subcontract Number 186 which commenced on January 1, 1949 and which runs to December 31, 1953. He said that VON NEUMANN's subcontract provided for consultant services on High Speed Computational Methods, Methods of Generating Random Variables and the Monte Carlo Mathematical Method in general. In connection with VON NEUMANN's services, Mr. HENSON stated that the employee provides consultant services to the Engineering Division of the K-25 Plant at Oak Ridge in the field of pure and applied mathematics as well as to the Oak Ridge National Laboratory Mathematics Panel. Mr. HENSON said that aside from the fact that he personally supervises the employee's consultant subcontract, he knows very little concerning him. He pointed out that VON NEUMANN has to his knowledge never spent much time in Oak Ridge and particularly during the past several years. In this respect Mr. HENSON stated that VON NEUMANN has not been in Oak Ridge for any period of time long enough to establish residence.</p> <p>DR. ALVIN M. WEINBERG, Research Director, ORNL, advised that he has been professionally acquainted with the employee for about 3 or 4 years. He indicated that he was first introduced to VON NEUMANN approximately 10 years ago but did not really get to know him other than through reputation until a few years ago. He said that the employee has the reputation of being one of the most influential scientists in the United States from the standpoint of military technology adding that VON NEUMANN also has the general reputation of being the 20th century's greatest mathematician. Dr. WEINBERG pointed out that although he does not regard himself as a close associate of the employee, he has on one or more occasions discussed politics with VON NEUMANN resulting in his having</p>

the opinion that the employee is one of the most violently anti-Russians he knows. Dr. WEINBERG pointed out that nothing has ever come to his attention reflecting adversely on the employee from the standpoint of character, loyalty or associates adding that he believes VON NEUMANN a loyal American.

DR. ALSTON S. HOUSEHOLDER, in Charge of the Mathematics Panel, ORNL, advised that he has been professionally acquainted with the employee since about 1949. He pointed out that he has had very little social contact with the employee, therefore knows little concerning VON NEUMANN's ideological beliefs. Dr. HOUSEHOLDER indicated, however, that he considers VON NEUMANN a loyal American, and a person of unimpeachable character and associates in that he has never had information to the contrary come to his attention.

DR. JACK MOSHMAN, Senior Statistician, ORNL, stated that in connection with the employee's consultant services with the Laboratory, he has had occasion during the past 3 years to work with DR. VON NEUMANN. DR. MOSHMAN said that his contacts with the employee have been strictly limited to professional ones adding that nothing reflecting adversely on the employee's character, loyalty, or associates has come to his attention. He pointed out that DR. VON NEUMANN has a reputation in the highest order in his various scientific fields.

SYLVAN CROMER, Engineering Superintendent, K-25 Plant, advised that although his division has a consultant subcontract with VON NEUMANN, the contract responsibilities have been fulfilled or performed entirely in the employee's office at Princeton, New Jersey and not at the K-25 Plant. Mr. CROMER stated that it has been several years since he has seen the employee in Oak Ridge, adding that he does not know VON NEUMANN personally therefore can furnish no information about him from the standpoint of character, loyalty or associates.

The following investigation was conducted by SE [REDACTED] b7c

Identification Officer L. C. WILSON, Oak Ridge Police Department stated that he has no arrest records in his files identifiable with either JOHN VON NEUMANN or his wife, KLARA DAN VON NEUMANN.

AT KNOXVILLE, TENNESSEE:

Identification Officer, GEORGE IRELAND, Knoxville Police Department, stated that his records contain nothing concerning the employee or his wife.

ANCIL HALL, Knoxville Credit Bureau, advised that the employee and his wife are not known to that Bureau.

Personnel records of the University of California at Los Alamos, made available by Miss **ANN ZABADIL**, reflect that **VON NEUMANN** has been continuously attached to the Staff of the Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory in the capacity of Consultant from November 2, 1943 to the present. The records indicate that he has been actively employed at Los Alamos in such capacity during numerous intermittent periods, of short duration, between 1943 and the present, and that he has also performed considerable work for the Laboratory at Princeton University and at the Aberdeen Proving Grounds within same period. Instant records do not contain any information unfavorable to him in any respect.

California under date of October 2, 1943, reflects that he was born on December 28, 1903, at Budapest, Hungary; that he entered the United States at New York City on September 25, 1931, and that he became a naturalized citizen of the United States on January 8, 1937, at Trenton, New Jersey. This application form reflects that his father, MAX VON NEUMANN, was deceased at that time, and that his mother, MARGARET VON NEUMANN, a naturalized citizen of the United States, was at that time residing in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

Dr. JORDAN CARSON MARK, Division Leader, ~~Theoretical Physics Division~~, University of California, advised that he first met VON NEUMANN and his wife about 1946 or 1947 and that he has worked rather closely with VON NEUMANN in his position as consultant since that time. He further advised that inasmuch as VON NEUMANN is administratively assigned as a consultant to the Theoretical Physics Division he has worked very closely with him whenever his services have been utilized by the Laboratory. He explained that Dr. VON NEUMANN usually spends a total of three or four weeks a year at Los Alamos, but has in the past performed considerable other work at his normal location of Princeton University and under various contracts with the University of California. Dr. MARK further advised that he has been a fairly close social acquaintance of the employee and his wife during a like period of time, and that they visit in each other's homes whenever convenient. He did not indicate, however, that he considered the VON NEUMANNs to be particularly intimate friends of he or his wife.

Dr. MARK stated that in his opinion Dr. VON NEUMANN and his wife are individuals of unimpeachable character, and are entirely loyal to the United States and the democratic form of government. He has never known either of them to entertain any sympathy for any foreign government or type of government. So far as he knows, the VON NEUMANNs do not have any close relative or particular contact still residing in continental Europe. He added that the employee and his wife have at various times appeared to be quite "disturbed" about the threat of communism or communist domination in both Europe and the United States. He stated that they have always appeared to be completely opposed to any such political philosophy.

Dr. MARK advised that the only organization that he has known VON NEUMANN to be affiliated with is the American mathematical society which he has served as president. He stated that other than himself, the VON NEUMANNs have particularly associated with Mr. and Mrs. STANISLAW ULAM and Mr. and Mrs. G. FOSTER EVANS at Los Alamos, and that to the best of his knowledge their social acquaintances at Princeton University have been limited to their professional colleagues.

Dr. MARK informed that he is cognizant of the fact that ISRAEL HALPERIN, a reputed Soviet espionage agent, was at one time a student of JOHN VON NEUMANN, but stated that VON NEUMANN has never indicated to him that he had any particularly close contact with HALPERIN, or that such association exceeded a normal professor-student relationship. He concluded

that he considers VON NEUMANN to be thoroughly trustworthy in regard to confidential information, and that he would give him his highest recommendation for any position of trust.

Mr. JAMES L. TUCK, Physicist and Group Leader, University of California, Los Alamos, recalls that he first met Dr. VON NEUMANN during the time that he was attending a scientific conference in England sometime in 1942, but that his contact with him there was very limited, and he has become much better acquainted with him through a working relationship at Los Alamos and Princeton University between 1944 and the present. He has had only a limited amount of social contact with him and is not acquainted with any of his relatives except his wife. He stated that Dr. VON NEUMANN and his wife are people of unimpeachable character, and that he has never had any reason to question their loyalty to the United States or the democratic form of government in any respect. He advised that they are both very intelligent individuals but that he has never known them to express more than a normal interest in political ideology or political questions. He has only known VON NEUMANN to be affiliated with professional organizations, and furthermore has only known him to associate with apparently responsible and loyal individuals.

Mr. TUCK definitely pointed out that VON NEUMANN is the actual originator of much classified data and confidential information relative to experimental weapons, but stated that to the best of his knowledge and belief VON NEUMANN has always been very careful in the handling and protection of such classified information. In this connection, he pointed out that VON NEUMANN and he were involved in an incident at Los Alamos, New Mexico, in August, 1953 which might be considered a procedural security violation, but stated that he does not consider that VON NEUMANN was actually responsible for this matter in any way. In describing the incident, he stated that Dr. T. H. JOHNSON, Director of the Division of Research, AEC, Washington, D. C., and a Mr. ROBERT R. WILSON of the Livermore, California, Laboratory, arrived at Los Alamos on a Sunday in the forepart of August, 1953, upon very short prior notice. These individuals desired to obtain the opinions of Dr. VON NEUMANN and Mr. TUCK relative to a matter in which Mr. WILSON was vitally concerned at that time. They explained however, that Mr. WILSON could only spend a matter of a few hours at Los Alamos and that it had not been possible to furnish the AEC Security Officials at Los Alamos sufficient data for them to furnish the appropriate clearances and passes for admission to the restricted or working areas at Los Alamos. Mr. TUCK advised that there was no question in the mind of either Dr. VON NEUMANN or himself, but that Dr. JOHNSON and Mr. WILSON were actually cleared for any information in connection with the AEC program, but that VON NEUMANN did voice an objection to discussing any such information on the Sunday at The Lodge, a public hotel at Los Alamos, and outside of the guarded or restricted areas where all confidential or classified work is normally performed. Mr. TUCK advised, however, that he and VON NEUMANN eventually acquiesced and did enter into a discussion of such a matter in a room at The Lodge because of the desires of Dr. JOHNSON and his insistence that Mr. WILSON could not remain at Los Alamos until the following Monday. Mr. TUCK stated, however, that this discussion was commenced over the

object of Dr. VON NEUMANN, who appeared fully cognizant of the fact that such a discussion should not have been commenced outside of an appropriately guarded or restricted area. He further stated that neither he nor VON NEUMANN discussed their work or anything that was being done at Los Alamos, and that actually, in his opinion, the data which were discussed was not of a highly classified nature. He added that he is quite certain that VON NEUMANN has never made a practice of discussing any possibly classified information in hotel rooms or public places, and that he is normally very discreet and careful in his conversations. He concluded that in his opinion VON NEUMANN can be completely trusted with confidential data.

Mr. NICHOLAS METROPOLIS, Group Leader, Theoretical Physics Division, University of California at Los Alamos, advised that he has known and worked with VON NEUMANN to a considerable extent between 1948 and the present. He has also had considerable social contact with VON NEUMANN and his wife, and advised specifically that he met YVONNE NEUMANN in Athens, Greece, in the Fall of 1952, and attended a Scientific Congress with them at Constantinople a few days later. At the conclusion of the Congress he returned to Athens with them, but YVONNE NEUMANN then went on to Rome and he did not have any further contact with them during that trip. He stated that neither during this trip, nor at any other time, has he ever known either Dr. or Mrs. VON NEUMANN to indicate that they presently have any close relative or particular contact at any place in continental Europe. He is cognizant of the fact that Mrs. VON NEUMANN has a sister residing in England, but is not acquainted with her in any way.

Mr. METROPOLIS stated that both VON NEUMANN and his wife are individuals of unimpeachable character, and that they are absolutely loyal to the United States and the democratic form of government. He added that he is sure that both Dr. and Mrs. VON NEUMANN are "definitely anti-communist" in their political philosophy or ideology. He has known VON NEUMANN to be an active member of the American Mathematical Society, and the American Physical Society, but has never known him to be affiliated with any other organization. He advised that the close associates of Dr. VON NEUMANN appeared to be limited almost entirely to individuals with whom they have professional connections and that at Los Alamos he has known them to particularly associate with Mr. and Mrs. STANISLAW ULAM and Mr. and Mrs. G. FOSTER EVANS. At Princeton University he has known the VON NEUMANNs to be very friendly with Professor H. D. SYMME and with OSCAR MORGANSTEIN, both members of the faculty there. He indicated that he considers all of these individuals to be loyal and reputable citizens.

Mr. METROPOLIS concluded that he has only known VON NEUMANN to be very careful and conscientious in the protection of any possibly classified information, and that he considers him to be entirely trustworthy with such information.

Mr. BENGT G. CARLSON, Group Leader, University of California at

Los Alamos, advised that he has worked with or for VON NEUMANN during occasional short periods between 1948 and the present, but that he has had only very casual outside or social contact with him. He stated that Dr. VON NEUMANN is a very capable and responsible individual of good character, and that he has never had any reason to question the loyalty of either he or his wife to the United States or the democratic form of government. He further advised that to the best of his knowledge neither Mr. or Mrs. VON NEUMANN have any current contacts or relatives outside of the United States, and that they only associate with the most reputable individuals. He concluded that to the best of his knowledge Dr. VON NEUMANN can be entirely trusted with confidential information.

Mr. GEORGE FOSTER EVANS and his wife, CERDA LOUISE EVANS, Mathematicians, University of California at Los Alamos, advised that they have known Dr. VAN NEUMANN and his wife since about 1948. They have worked with the VON NEUMANNs at Aberdeen Proving Ground, Princeton University, and Los Alamos, New Mexico, on several occasions since that time. They have also been quite close social friends and have frequently visited in each other's home. They do not believe that either Dr. VON NEUMANN or his wife has any close relative presently residing outside of the United States except one sister and at least one nephew of Mrs. VON NEUMANN who presently reside in England. They advised that Mrs. VON NEUMANN has indicated that she and her husband are acquainted with a few individuals that they believe to be still residing in Hungary, but that she has never indicated that they have had any recent contact with such individuals.

Mr. and Mrs. EVANS both stated that VON NEUMANN and his wife are entirely loyal to the United States and the democratic form of government, and that they are more pronounced in their statements indicating such loyalty than the average citizen. They further advised that to the best of their knowledge all of the relatives of employee and his wife residing in the United States are very respectable people and are loyal to the United States. They have known VON NEUMANN as a former president of the American Mathematical Society and to be affiliated with the American Physical Society, but they have never known either VON NEUMANN or his wife to be affiliated with any other organization. Mr. and Mrs. EVANS stated that to the best of their knowledge all associates of VON NEUMANN and his wife have been entirely responsible and loyal individuals. At Los Alamos they have known the VON NEUMANNs to most frequently associate with Dr. and Mrs. J. CARSON MARK, and with Mr. and Mrs. STANISLAW ULAM. They concluded that VON NEUMANN has always appeared to be very security conscious in regard to confidential information, and they consider him to be entirely trustworthy.

Mrs. LOIS ILES, Secretary, University of California at Los Alamos, advised that she has had some contact with Dr. VON NEUMANN during his visits and work at Los Alamos, but that such contact has been limited entirely to business and such matters as his accommodations and reservations. She stated that to the best of her knowledge he is a respectable individual and a loyal citizen. She further advised that during the visits of VON NEUMANN and his

wife to Los Alamos, they have only resided at the Lodge and never been furnished any type of private residential accommodations.

NEIGHBORS AND ACQUAINTANCES

At Los Alamos, New Mexico

Mrs. ELSIE MARSH, Zia Company Housing Office, advised that records of that office do not reflect that the employee has ever been furnished any type of private residential quarters at Los Alamos. She advised that to the best of her knowledge, VON NEUMANN and his wife have always resided at The Lodge during their occasional visits to Los Alamos.

Mr. ROBERT E. CARAWAY, Manager, and Mr. ARNOLD SHOLD, Assistant Manager, The Lodge, Los Alamos, each advised that he has known VON NEUMANN and his wife as occasional residents at The Lodge during short periods of time over the last five or six years. Each stated that they have always conducted themselves in a very respectable manner and appear to be entirely responsible individuals. Each stated that he has never had any reason to question the loyalty of VON NEUMANN or his wife in any respect, and that they only appear to associate with the very "top" scientists at Los Alamos.

Mr. STANISLAW MARCIN ULAM, Mathematician, University of California, at Los Alamos, advised that he first met Dr. VON NEUMANN during a trip he made to Poland in 1935, and that he has had considerable contact with him in the United States since about 1938. He explained, however, that within that period they have usually been affiliated with different Universities and his contact with VON NEUMANN has been only intermittent and somewhat limited to social visits whenever possible. He indicated, however, that he and his wife consider themselves to be rather intimate friends of Dr. and Mrs. VON NEUMANN.

Mr. ULAM stated that Dr. VON NEUMANN and his wife are individuals of unimpeachable character and habits and that Dr. VON NEUMANN is a world renowned and respected mathematician. He stated that since he and his wife became naturalized citizens of this country, there has never been any question about their complete loyalty to the United States and the democratic form of government. He further advised that to his knowledge, Mrs. VON NEUMANN has one sister presently residing in England, but they do not have any other relatives or particularly close contacts outside of the United States. Mr. ULAM has known Dr. VON NEUMANN as a very active member of the American Mathematical Society and the American Physical Society but has never known either he or his wife to be affiliated with any other organization. He also stated that in his opinion, both Dr. VON NEUMANN and his wife are "extremely conservative" in their political ideology and philosophy and they have never been affiliated with any possibly questionable organization.

In regard to the associates of Dr. and Mrs. VON NEUMANN, Mr. ULAM

stated that they have only associated with very reputable, loyal citizens who are eminent figures in various scientific fields. He advised that he has frequently observed a professor of economics named OSCAR MORGANSTEIN to visit in employee's home at Princeton University, and indicated that to the best of his knowledge, MORGANSTEIN is an entirely respectable and loyal individual. He concluded that he definitely believes that Dr. VON NEUMANN can be entirely trusted with any confidential information or restricted data and pointed out that he actually originates a great deal of such data in the field of atomic energy.

CREDIT

At Santa Fe, New Mexico

Mr. BERT BROWN, Manager, Merchant's Credit Service, which covers Los Alamos, New Mexico, advised that the records of that agency do not contain any information relative to the employee or his wife.

CRIMINAL

At Los Alamos, New Mexico

The records of the Los Alamos Police Department were checked with negative results in that they do not reflect any criminal data relative to employee or his wife.

MISCELLANEOUS

At Los Alamos, New Mexico

The files of the AEC Security Branch reflect that on August 10, 1953, information was furnished to the AEC by a confidential source indicating that a possible procedural security violation had been committed at Los Alamos on August 9, 1953, by Dr. T. H. JOHNSON, Director of Division of Research, AEC, Washington, D. C.; Mr. ROBERT R. WILSON of the Livermore (California) Laboratory; Mr. JAMES L. TUCK, and Dr. JOHN VON NEUMANN, in that they discussed possibly classified matter in a room at The Lodge, a public hotel located outside of the restricted areas at Los Alamos. The files reflect that Mr. TUCK was interviewed by AEC security officials and furnished information corresponding to that attributed to him above and indicating that although such a discussion was held, it was not at the instigation, and in fact was over the objection of Mr. TUCK and VON NEUMANN. Instant files further reflect that VON NEUMANN was also interviewed by AEC security officials; that he explained the data that were discussed on that occasion, and stated that he had been reluctant to participate in a discussion of this nature on a Sunday and

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outside of the restricted area, but had done so at the request of Dr. JOHNSON. So far as reflected by the files, no further action was taken by the AEC in regard to this matter, and the files do not contain any other information unfavorable to VON NEUMANN, except as previously furnished to the AEC.

The files of the AEC Security Branch at Los Alamos further reflect that information relative to the below listed individuals, all described as close associates of VON NEUMANN, has previously been furnished to the AEC:

WRC Bryan LaPlante of the Atomic Energy Commission (AEC) advised Liaison Agent [redacted] on December 29, 1955, that it had recently been discovered that Dr. Von Neumann has a very advanced case of cancer. He is taking daily radiation treatments at Walter Reed Hospital. The cancer is located in the shoulder area and has affected his equilibrium and motivation. He cannot walk without assistance. LaPlante stated that this condition was first discovered in August, 1955, and has progressed rapidly. LaPlante has talked to Dr. Shields Warren of Boston who is treating Von Neumann and from the conversation it is only a matter of time until the cancer will prove fatal. Dr. Von Neumann makes every effort to come to the office on each day but on several occasions has had to be taken home.

LaPlante stated this information is only known to a few top people in the AEC and that no publicity at all has been put out concerning it.

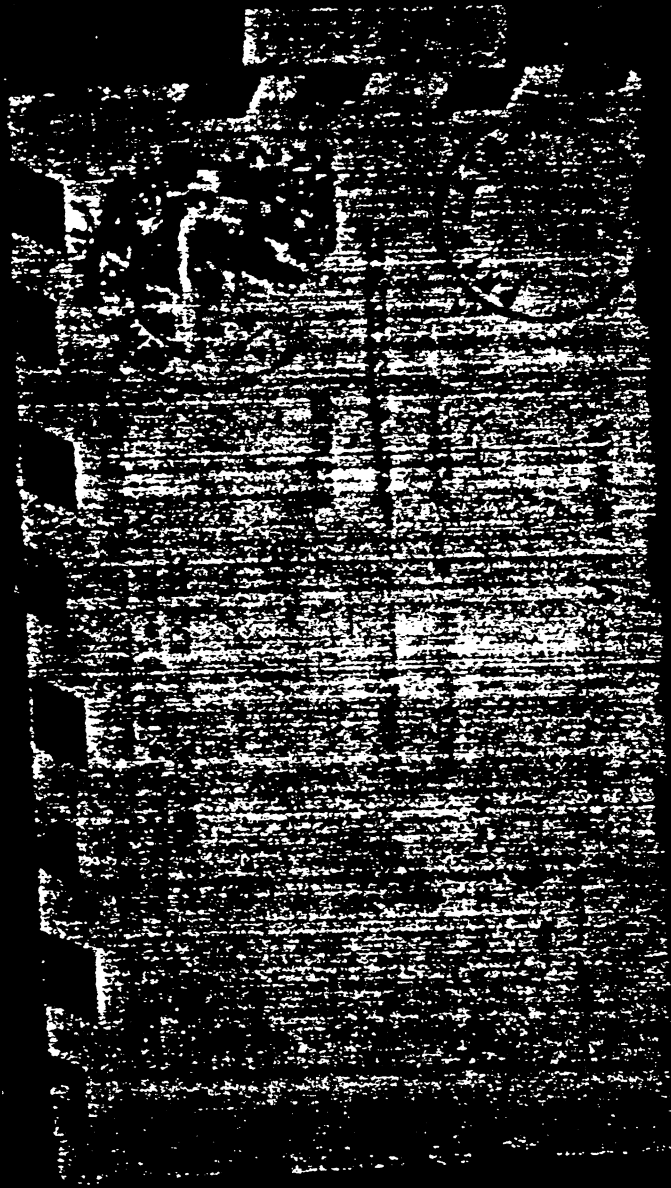

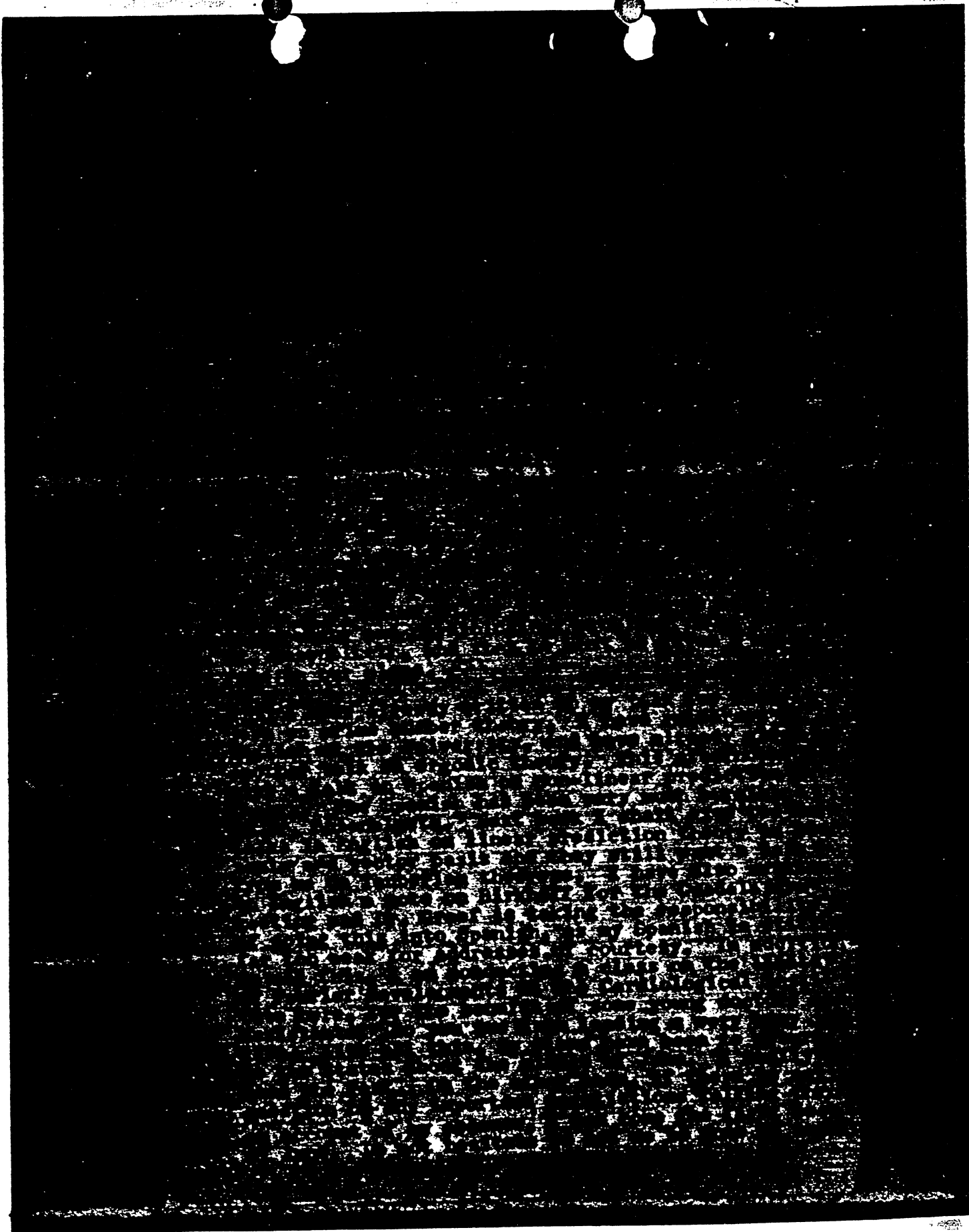

1. Attached herewith Personnel Security Questionnaire, triplicate of John R. YON NEHEM, who has access to secret information on this Project.

2. A review of the inclosure indicates foreign connections, and this office is of the opinion that investigation should be initiated through Intelligence channels. Request your office conduct an investigation to include interviews with at least three unprejudiced persons who can certify as to the loyalty and discretion of Subject.

3. The Central Files of Federal Bureau of Investigation, Office of Naval Intelligence and Military Intelligence Service in Washington disclosed no information re Subject except that the FBI has one J. V. Neumann, Fine Hall, Princeton, New Jersey, recorded as having been on the mailing list of the German Library of Information, Battery Place, New York, New York. This association is closely affiliated with the German Consulate General at the same address. Whether Subject and the individual of the FBI report are the same is not known by this office.

Re: Examination of records of the Censorship of New York

On 30 November 1943, this Agent examined the files of the Censorship of New York at 67 Broadway, New York, New York, to obtain information relative to this investigation.

I This examination revealed that the Office of Naval Censorship had on three separate occasions intercepted messages sent either to or through Subject's wife, Clara Von Neumann. The first record of Subject appeared in a series of several cables sent both to and received from JOHN VON NEUMANN while he was living in London between 16 February and 22 April of 1942. These cables were all between Subject and his wife and contained greetings and advice as to his arrival and his prospective plans while in London. Also contained in this file was a cable dated 7 December 1942 from one Antonio Monterio-Faculade Deciencias, Lisbon, Portugal, who appeared to be a refugee attempting to get clearance to the United States, the purpose of his cable to urge Subject to take whatever steps possible to hasten his entrance to the United States. Subject had answered this cable stating that he had made no headway but would continue his efforts.

II In memorandum dated 18 June 1942, a cover made by the Office of Naval Censorship revealed that Mrs. Clara Von Neumann, 26 Westcott Road, Princeton, New Jersey, had sent and received a series of cables and telephone calls to and from Dr. Laidislas Richter at Zurich, Switzerland. This correspondence took place during 10 days in May of 1942. The substance of these messages concerned the health of Mrs. Von Neumann and that of her family in Hungary. It was the opinion of the Censorship of New York that Richter was conveying information to enemy territory and care to neutral Switzerland to receive the information from this country. It appeared Richter was a Hungarian National and also that he was a friend of either Mrs. Von Neumann or her family in Hungary. Inasmuch as her messages were of a seemingly harmless nature, it was thought that her sole reason for contacting Richter was to receive word from her family and to assure them of her safety in this country. No action was ever taken by the Navy in this regard.

III In a memorandum made in October, 1943 reference to Mrs. Von Neumann was intercepted indirectly when a cable from Switzerland was received by one Thomas Forbath, a native of Hungary who is presently an exchange student at

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Columbia University, New York, New York. In answer to a follow-up letter written him by the Navy, Ferbath explained that he was acquainted with Mrs. Von Neumann's family in Hungary and their safety was to be communicated to her by him.

Re: Interview with Mr. Frank Aydelotte

On 4 December 1943, this Agent interviewed Mr. Frank Aydelotte, director, The Institute for Advanced Study, at his office in Princeton, New Jersey, to obtain information relative to Subject.

Aydelotte revealed that he had known Subject for the past 10 years and described him as a naturalized citizen, having been born in Hungary in December of 1905 and coming to the United States around 1930. He said Subject was educated at the University of Berlin and at the University of Zurich in Switzerland and had been employed as an instructor in both of these institutions prior to his coming to Princeton University. Subject came to Princeton in 1930 as a professor of Mathematics and was made a member of the faculty at the Institute for Advanced Study in 1933. He is presently employed in that position at a salary of \$12,500 per annum.

Aydelotte stated that Subject was divorced from his first wife around 1937 and married his present wife (Clara Von Neumann) in Hungary in 1938. Aydelotte continued that Clara Von Neumann is not a citizen, but he described her as a loyal person who is anxious to complete her residence requirements in order to be admitted to citizenship.

(An examination of the records of the Princeton Police Department, Princeton, New Jersey, revealed a questionnaire filed by Mrs. Von Neumann, which set forth that she had lost her Hungarian citizenship when she married an American citizen, and her naturalization proceedings were underway, final action pending the completion of three years residence.)

Aydelotte did not know the extent of Mrs. Von Neumann's family ties in Hungary but felt certain that they would not be strong enough to effect her loyalty to the United States or to effect Subject in his work for the United States Government.

Aydelotte characterized Subject as one of the most brilliant mathematicians and physicists in the world today, placing him next to Albert Einstein in this field. He said he had a great capacity for work and had constantly over a period of years made valuable contributions to the study of Mathematics. Aydelotte continued that for the past two or three years Subject had devoted all of his time to research and

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development of war instruments for the United States Government. He said he had been employed by the Army at Aberdeen Proving Grounds in Maryland and presently spends two or three days a week there. He said about a year ago Subject had been employed by the Navy in some secret work and had spent sometime in England while on this project. He said that Subject was presently engaged in a secret research project for the Army at the Institute for Advanced Study and was attempting to find time to undertake some work for the British Admiralty.

Aydelotte stated that Subject was primarily a scientist and had never evidenced any great interest in politics or social problems; however, he said Subject had a natural concern for a more orderly world system and had elaborated with a Professor Morganstern of the Economics Department of Princeton University on a theory of economics based on mathematical principles. Subject and Morganstern are attempting to have this theory published, but Aydelotte thought that fewer than 5 or 6 economists in the world would be able to understand it inasmuch as the book was largely a mathematical treatise.

Aydelotte concluded by saying that there was absolutely no question in his mind as to Subject's loyalty. He said that Subject was Jewish by birth and certainly anti-Fascist. He thought he was more a liberal than a conservative but restated that his interest was passive, and he had never had as much as a short discussion with Subject on world politics of any nature.

Agent's Note:

Inasmuch as Subject's background has been thoroughly investigated by the Navy and by the Office of Naval Intelligence (Memo), this Agent believes that further investigation at Princeton University and the Institute for Advanced Study is unnecessary.

2. Inclosed herewith is a summary of information concerning Albert Francis Birch. There was no record of him in MID or FBI.

3. A check of the files of the Federal Bureau of Investigation disclosed the following information:

The name D. Albert Lee Andrew Casey was mentioned on a list of members of Technocracy, Inc., in Detroit. No record of him in MID or ONI.

One J. V. Weisman, Fine Hall, Princeton, New Jersey, was on the mailing list of the German Library of Information, Battery Place, New York, New York. This association is closely affiliated with the German Consulate General at the same address. No record of him in MID or ONI.

4. There was no record of Lester S. Stamps in FBI or ONI. However, in MID files there was a notation that a Seventh Service Command report dated 1-12-42 was sent to Office Provost Marshal General, and a Sixth Service Command report dated 1-1-42 had also been sent to the Provost Marshal General. Upon calling the Provost Marshal General's office here it was learned that their files have been decentralized to the Service Commands, so we will request the Service Commands to send those reports to you.

This letter was postmarked February 7, 1944 and was on the nature of a thank you letter for hospitality to GODOFERDO GARCIA during his stay at Princeton. This letter also informed the subject that GARCIA had been elected as an associate member of the National Academy of Exact Sciences, Physical and Natural, of Lima.

The subject also received a letter postmarked April 27, 1945 from "NORBERT W.", Instituto Nacional de Cardiologia, Calzanda de la piedad 300, Mexico, D.F. Mexico. This letter indicated that the movements of VON NEUMAN were known in Mexico and it was indicated that the presence of other scientists in the vicinity of Sante Fe, New Mexico was also known. VON NEUMAN was invited to visit Mexico while he was in Sante Fe. In this letter "NORBERT W." stated that a (Dr.) ROSENBLUETH and VALLARTA sent their regards to the subject. These two persons were associated apparently with "NORBERT W." at the Instituto Nacional de Cardiologia.

Confidential Informant T-1 interviewed Mr. FRANK AYDELOTTE, Director of the Institute for Advanced Study at Princeton, New Jersey, and the following information was set forth as a result of this interview:

AYDELOTTE stated that in 1943 he had known the subject for about 10 years and stated the subject had been employed as an instructor in the University of Berlin and the University of Zurich, Switzerland, prior to coming to Princeton, New Jersey.

The subject came to Princeton in 1930 as a professor of mathematics and made a member of the faculty at the Institute for Advanced Study in 1933. AYDELOTTE further advised that the subject was divorced from his first wife around 1937 and married his present wife, CLARA VON NEUMANN, in Hungary in 1938.

AYDELOTTE stated that the subject's wife, CLARA VON NEUMANN, was not a citizen of the United States but he described her as a loyal person who was completing her residence requirements in order to be admitted to citizenship. AYDELOTTE did not know the extent of Mrs. VON NEUMANN'S family ties in Hungary but felt certain that they would not be strong enough to affect her loyalty to the United States or affect the subject in his work for the United States Government.

AYDELOTTE characterized the subject as one of the most brilliant mathematicians in the world today placing him next to ALBERT EINSTEIN.

AYDELOTTE stated that the subject was primarily a scientist and had never evidenced any great interest in politics or social problems. He advised, however, that the subject had a natural concern for a more orderly world system and had collaborated with a Professor MORGANSTEIN of the Economics Department of Princeton University on the theory of economics based on mathematical principles. AYDELOTTE thought that fewer than five or six economists would be able to understand the theory of the subject inasmuch as it was a book based largely on a mathematical treatise.

AYDELOTTE stated that there was absolutely no question in his mind as to subject's loyalty. He stated that the subject was Jewish by birth and certainly anti-Fascist. He expressed the thought that the subject was more of a liberal than a conservative, and stated that the subject's interest was passive and that he had never had as much as a short discussion with the subject on world politics of any nature.

Information furnished by Confidential Informant T-1 further indicated that Mrs. CLARA VON NEUMANN, 26 Westcott Road, Princeton, New Jersey had sent and received a series of cables and telephone calls to and from a Dr. LAIDISLAS RITCHTER at Zurich, Switzerland.) It was indicated from the file that Dr. RITCHTER was conveying information in the immediate territory and came to neutral Switzerland to receive information from this country. It was stated that it appeared that RITCHTER was a Hungarian national and also that he was a friend of Mrs. VON NEUMANN or her family in Hungary. The messages were of a seemingly harmless nature and the reason for the calls was to receive word from and of her family and to assure them of her safety in this country.

Confidential Informant T-2 produced records which showed that JOHN NEUMANN had purchased an auto for \$650.00 in 1930.

Confidential Informant T-3 furnished information to the effect that JOHN VON NEUMANN, 26 Westcott Road, was employed in the Department of Mathematics at the Institute of Advanced Study and he did his banking at the Princeton Bank and Trust Company, Princeton, New Jersey. He indicated further that he owned no real estate and that he had resided in Princeton since 1933.

It further reflected that he was arrested in the State of Maryland about two years ago (date of report 3-20-49) on a charge of speeding. This record further reflected that the Lumbermen's Insurance Company, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania had declined to carry insurance on the subject's car due to a number of minor claims reported.

Chief of Police EDWARD MAHAN of the Princeton Police Department advised that he had no record of the subject but his records reflected that Mrs. JOHN VON NEUMANN of 26 Westcott Road, Princeton, New Jersey, had been given a parking ticket on January 25, 1946.

Dr. M. H. NICHOLS in the Department of Physics, Palmer Laboratory, Princeton, New Jersey, advised that he had been acquainted with the subject since 1940. He stated that he had worked with the subject on a project which was not connected with Princeton University. He stated that he classified Dr. VON NEUMANN as one of the world's best mathematicians and advised that he considered him a loyal American. He stated he had no knowledge of the subject's economical or political beliefs.

Dr. HENRY D. SMYTHE, Department of Physics, Palmer Physical Laboratory, Princeton, New Jersey, was interviewed and stated that he had known the subject approximately 15 years and that he had known him very well for a period of seven or eight years. Dr. SMYTHE stated he knew subject's wife very well also. Dr. SMYTHE classified subject's wife as the most passionately loyal American that he knew.

He stated that he considered the subject's loyalty of such a nature that no foreign power would even consider contacting him for information. He stated that he knew that JOHNNY VON NEUMANN lived up to the letter of the law with respect to his confidential work and did not even talk to him, Dr. SMYTHE, on the Manhattan Engineering Project until it was approved by the War Department.

Dr. SMYTHE stated that he did not consider the subject a likely prospect for any foreign government to contact and that he further did not consider him a likely contact for any of the American Communists.

I recently went to the home of Mr. Dayton Vohres to keep an appointment with him for the purpose of discussing information he had concerning members of the Institute for Advanced Study; Dr. John Von Neumann and Mrs. Katherine Russell in particular. I was accompanied at this interview by Mr. Edward J. Brosnan of this office. We arrived at Mr. Vohres' home at 11:30 a. m., Friday, November 12, 1954, and visited with him until 1:30 p. m. that afternoon.

Mr. Vohres is seventy-two years of age and was a professor of Political Science at Princeton University from 1919 until 1950 when he retired at the age of sixty-eight. Mr. Vohres has been very active as a member of the City Council at Princeton for the past fourteen years. For the last four years, he has also acted as Commissioner of Police. He is apparently well known and well respected in the Princeton community and is very active in the civic affairs of Princeton.

The bulk of Mr. Vohres' information concerning members of the Institute for Advanced Study is based upon local town gossip, facts obtained from members of the Princeton Police Force, and Mr. Rudolph Tessein, PBA guard at the Institute.

Mr. Vohres said that the local townspeople considered the members of the Institute as being a very clanish group whose ideologies border somewhat on the "pink" side. He said that it seemed incredible to most of them that the Director of the Institute, Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer, would be removed from access to classified information by the government and then remain as Director of the Institute for Advanced Study. He said that it was even more surprising when it was announced that Dr. Von Neumann, a subordinate to Dr. Oppenheimer and one who had defended Dr. Oppenheimer during his hearing, was appointed as a member of the Commission where he would have a high degree of access to sensitive information and may, in all probability out of loyalty to Dr. Oppenheimer and professional association, impart some of the information to him.

Mr. Vohres said that the incident which made him decide to discuss the matter with Senator Alexander Smith (of New Jersey) was a recent interview which he, Vohres, had with Mr. Rudolph Tessein, a guard at the Institute. Mr. Tessein told Mr. Vohres that Mrs. Gorman, Dr. Von Neumann's secretary, Mrs. Russell, Dr. Oppenheimer's secretary, and he held the combination to the vault at the Institute. Mr. Tessein also stated that Mrs. Russell and Mrs. Gorman worked closely together and that he heard Mrs. Russell was going to be made secretary

to Dr. Von Neumann. After receiving this information from Mr. Tessein, Mr. Vohres decided to discuss same with his next-door neighbor, Charles Erdman, Jr., a former mayor of Princeton who served ten terms as a Republican mayor for that city. Mr. Erdman suggested that he and Mr. Vohres contact Senator Smith, which they did on Sunday, November 7, 1954. The foregoing information was passed along to Senator Smith, who, in turn, relayed same to you.

Mr. Vohres impressed me as being a very astute and alert gentleman who has a deep sense of loyalty to this country and who is an extremely security-conscious individual. Both Mr. Vohres and Mr. Erdman are Republican leaders and prominent citizens of Princeton. Mr. Vohres stated that he is well acquainted with the business leaders of the town of Princeton, the Board of Regents, and the professors of Princeton University.

Mr. Vohres added that a Professor James W. Alexander, member of the Institute for Advanced Study and professor in the School of Mathematics at Princeton, has long been a member of the Communist Party; that he openly admitted it and held Communist Party meetings at his home frequently during the Depression years. Mr. Vohres stated that Dr. John Von Neumann and Professor Alexander were well acquainted.

Another incident outlined by Mr. Vohres involves a prominent and respected citizen of Princeton referred to by Mr. Vohres as Mrs. Brummer, who, according to Mr. Vohres, is your first cousin. Mr. Vohres said that he plays bridge with Mrs. Brummer frequently and that on one occasion in the summer of 1953 Mrs. Brummer's gardener by the name of Rossi had told Nellie, the Irish cook for Mrs. Brummer, that he was going abroad for a visit and that he had a package which he was to deliver to someone for Dr. Oppenheimer. Mr. Vohres stated that he contacted the local FBI agent in Princeton and gave him this information and that he further understood a full-scale investigation was made by the FBI.

I explained to Mr. Vohres the fact that we had removed all classified information from the vault at Princeton University; that Dr. John Von Neumann had been thoroughly investigated and cleared by the government prior to his appointment, and that present plans were for us to establish a facility aside and apart from the University in Princeton which would be operated by AEC employees for use by all consultants of the Commission and other individuals in that area who would require access to classified information. I added that, in this way, we could assure the proper security safeguards for the protection of classified information and would have a much better control of all security interests in that area.

Mr. Vohres stated that he could not expand upon the information furnished Senator Smith or me; however, he felt it necessary to call it to the attention of the proper authorities.

I thanked Mr. Vohres for his kind cooperation and told him that I would relay same to you.
